



Town Hall Take-Along Guide

Stick with your prepared question - don't be afraid to read it verbatim.

Be polite but persistent. Demand real answers.

Do not give up the microphone until you're satisfied with the answer.

Keep the pressure on. After one member of the group finishes, everyone should raise their hands again.

EXAMPLE QUESTIONS

If your MoC (D) voted to table H. Res 537: “You voted against taking up the question of impeachment. I strongly support impeachment as do 84% of Democrats and one in five Republicans. Donald Trump’s unconstitutional actions warrant impeachment. Will you commit here and now to listen to your constituents and support impeachment?”

If your MoC (R) voted to table H. Res 537: You voted against taking up the question of impeachment. Do you believe that Donald Trump and his administration has violated the constitution during his current term? What is your plan to remove this threat to our democracy from office?

If your MoC voted in favor of H. Res 537: “Thank you for voting to take up the question of the impeachment of Donald J. Trump. Impeachment is supported by 84% of Democrats and one in five Republicans. Will you commit here and now to co-sponsoring the impeachment resolution?”

If your MoC claims “we don’t have the votes” for impeachment: What are you doing to normalize impeachment as a necessary and constitutional step to preserve our democracy?

If your MoC claims “impeachment is a distraction”: “How does keeping Donald Trump in power serve our interests?”

If your MoC claims “we should focus on the midterms”: “I expect integrity from my elected officials. If you are not willing to uphold your oath of office and impeach the president for blatantly unconstitutional actions, I am not going to vote for you. And, I will work to make sure my community understands you cannot be trusted to support and defend the constitution. Will you commit here and now to supporting impeachment as a part of your re-election platform?”
